The Utah Division of Indian Affairs, created in 1953, facilitates solutions that allow American Indians to share in the progress of the state. The Indian Affairs director serves as a liaison between Utah tribes, Governor Gary Herbert, state legislators, federal and state agencies, and local government. In FY18, these positive relationships were encouraged through the 12th annual Native American Summit, which brings together hundreds of attendees. Indian Affairs is also an important partner in Indian education and the Title VI program that has greatly improved graduation rates among American Indian and Alaskan Native students.

## Key Accomplishments

### The 12th Annual Governor's Native American Summit

The Governor's Native American Summit at Utah Valley University welcomed more than 500 tribal leaders and members, government officials, and students. The theme of "Embracing Paths to Success" reflected a focus on strengthening family and community. The Summit fosters an open dialogue to seek solutions that improve the quality of life for Native communities. During the Summit, 23 breakout sessions were offered for adults and 12 sessions for youth.

### Indigenous Day

Indian Affairs hosted the Indigenous Day celebration at the Natural History Museum of Utah for nearly 150 attendees. The theme, "Voices of the Landscape," emphasized the deep connections Native people have with culture, language, and oral history. Keynote speaker Howard Rainer, member of Taos Pueblo, spoke about strengthening Native people through contemporary and traditional storytelling. Students from the Urban Indian Center of Salt Lake youth program displayed breast plates.

### American Indian Caucus Day on the Hill

More than 200 people attended American Indian Caucus Day on the Hill in February 2018. Tribal Leaders met with Gov. Gary Herbert and Lt. Gov. Spencer Cox, while Native students shadowed legislators to learn about the legislative process. Indian Affairs also partnered with Richfield Dormitory School to have their students provide cultural performances, tour the Capitol, and learn about the legislative process.

### Ancient Native American Remains Burial

Representatives from the divisions of Indian Affairs, State History, and State Parks began to develop the process for implementing H.B. 394, which will determine the feasibility of using State Parks for the burial of ancient Native American remains. An essential component of the process has to be formal consultation with Utah and regional Tribes who have an interest in participating. Feedback and recommendations gathered through formal tribal consultation would be included in any further studies on reburial sites.

### American Indian Education

American Indian Services provides a math and science summer program for middle school students. The program prepares students to take advanced math classes in high school, thus creating opportunities to pursue science, technology, engineering, and mathematics studies in college. Now in its fourth year at Utah State University-Blanding, the program runs for six weeks each summer for three consecutive summers.

### Paiute Career and Education Expo

The division sponsored the Paiute Career and Education Expo for students in Cedar City in February 2018. Over 200 students had an opportunity to visit with universities, colleges and vocational/tech centers. The Expo educated students about higher education opportunities and informed them about possible careers. Students also heard from peers during a panel discussion about a variety of topics, from good study habits to personal stories about overcoming adversity.

### State Tribal Liaison Committee

During fiscal year 2018, the Division of Indian Affairs made a commitment to improve and strengthen state-tribal partnership with Utah's eight tribal nations by creating a State Tribal Liaison group. This group is comprised of tribal liaisons identified by their agency to address tribal issues and strengthen communication between agencies and tribes outlined in Executive Order 2014-005.

The liaison group met three times during fiscal year 2018 to discuss tribal issues, determine how best to work with tribes, and to receive education on tribal sovereignty. Innovative methods were developed to help track tribal concerns from initiation to completion and updates were provided at bimonthly Utah Tribal Leader meetings.

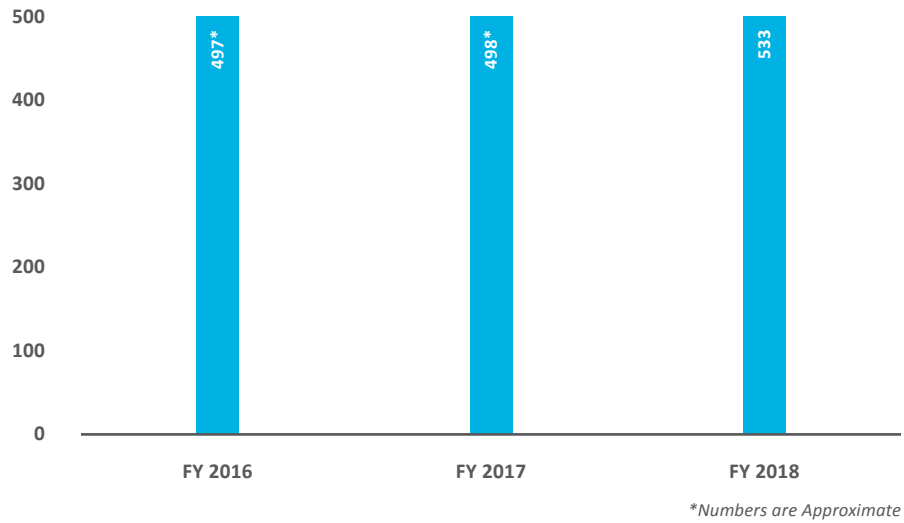

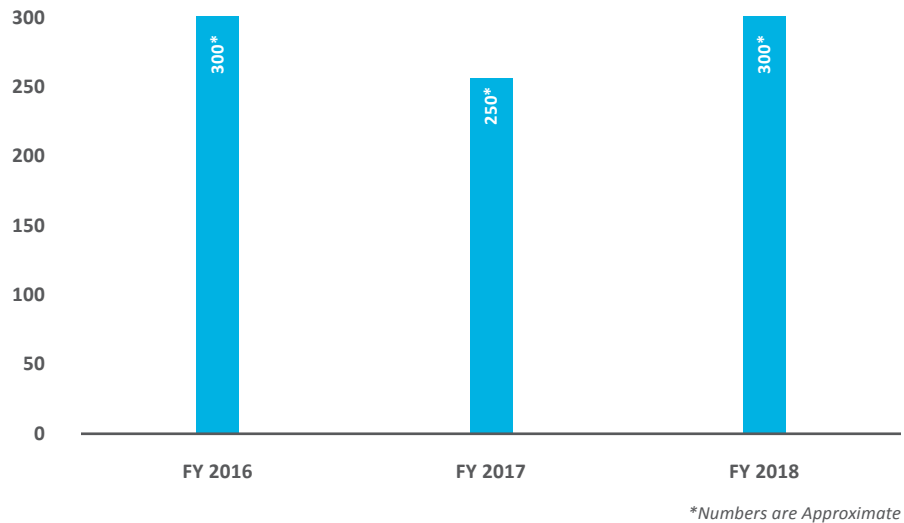

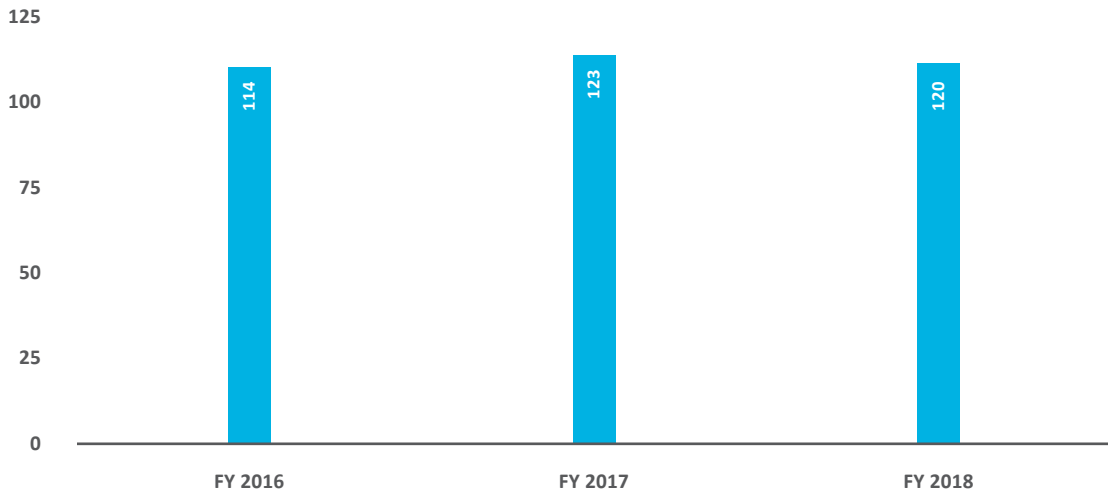
## Governor’s Native American Summit Attendance

Governor's Office	Water rights	Tribe involved with Nevada water hearings. The Governor stated that he will not sign the Las Vegas Nevada water request and Governor has not heard from the Nevada Governor.	This is an administrative process under Nevada law. Utah decided in 2013 not to participate in a groundwater management agreement authorized by Congress. The tribe has approached the state to quantify their federal reserved water right claims through compact to strengthen their claims against proposed groundwater projects in Nevada. The state met with them several times and tried to get Nevada to participate, but Nevada is uninterested in negotiating a settlement for the Nevada portion of the reservation. Utah remains willing to settle reserved water rights in Utah by negotiation, but resists requests for a federal negotiation team before agreement on settlement principals. The state has given that response to the Goshutes attorney and are awaiting further dialog.
Governor's Office	Indian Child Welfare Act	Request for the state to not sign with Texas in a lawsuit against ICWA laws. ICWA is working in Utah and the tribe is supportive of having the law to protect Indian children.	
Department of Public Safety/Driver's License	Tribal identification card	Still not being recognized as proof of identity. This impacts tribal members with birth certificates, driver license, and voting.

Funds come from the Federal HUD HOME program, legislative appropriations, and income from previous loans. Daniel specifically oversees the multifamily housing program, but also oversees "out of the box" single family programs that don't fit in with the Self-Help or other single family programs.

The UIHAB has Diabetes/Obesity as a priority to be addressed in all AI/AN communities for the next three years. The OAIANHA is also participating on the Nation Diabetes Prevention Program Advisory Board in Utah. The goal is to integrate each tribal SDPI program with this statewide initiative to improve capacity and improve health outcomes.
